OPTIONAL PRACTICAL TRAINING

Students graduating this Spring 2021 semester who wish to apply for Optional Practical Training (OPT) can apply as early as February 13th, 2021. OPT allows F-1 Students to engage in temporary employment to gain practical experience in their field of study. FILING TAX RETURNS: SPRINTAX WEBINAR

As an F-1 or J-1 student, it is important to be aware that, as a non-resident student in the U.S., you are legally required to file a tax return if you received U.S. income during 2020. Even if you did not work or receive income in the U.S., you are still obligated to file a Form 8843 with the IRS. To 'file' your taxes means to prepare and submit your income tax return from the previous year to the IRS using federal (and state) forms. The deadline to submit tax forms to the IRS is **Thursday**, **April 15**, **2021**. There are several different ways to file your taxes including using a tax preparation service (Sprintax, Glacier, Taxback), using a certified public accountant (clarifying non-resident tax status), or self-preparation.

The Division of Global Engagement has teamed up with Sprintax to provide you with an easy-to-use tax preparation software designed for non-resident students and scholars in the U.S. Sprintax will guide you through the tax preparation process, arrange the necessary documents, and determine if you are due a tax refund. Sprintax will host a webinar on Tuesday, March 16, 2021 at 12:30 p.m. where their staff will provide an overview of the core principles of U.S. non-resident tax for international students and scholars. Topics covered will include who must file a U.S. tax return, residency for tax purposes, FICA, amended returns, implications of misfiling, the stimulus check and much more. The link to the webinar will be sent to the University email of all F-1 and I-1 international students.

What's your favorite book/movie? My favorite book is "The Alchemist" by Paulo Coelho, and one of my favorite movies is "The Pursuit of Happyness."



MARDI GRAS AND KING CAKES

Mardi Gras is coming soon, and everyone is ready for the break and the king cake! Mardi Gras is a very unique holiday that has an exciting history. Set 46 days before Easter and marking the end of carnival season, this tradition coincides with the 40 days of Lent practiced by the Catholic Church. A popular tradition in Louisiana around Mardi Gras season is king cakes. Historically, a token would be placed in the cakes, and whoever found the token was declared royalty for the night. Now, a small plastic baby is put in the cake, and whoever finds it has to buy the next king cake!

King cakes are normally in stores around the beginning of the calendar year and stay on shelves until the day after Mardi Gras. The sweet, circular pastry is believed to have originated in France and Spain, and has travelled to the western world and become one of Louisiana's most anticipated traditions! Even though there won't be any parades this year, we hope you can celebrate Mardi Gras by picking yourself up a tasty king cake!



APPLICATIONS FOR DEGREES

All undergraduate and graduate students completing degree requirements in Spring 2021, Summer 2021, or Fall 2021 must submit an application for a degree. Applications must be submitted online prior to the deadlines listed below. If you have already submitted an application, you do not need to submit another one. Students completing degree requirements in Spring 2021 must apply no later than Friday, March 5th. Students who miss the deadline must complete a paper application by emailing graduation@louisiana.edu. Students completing degree requirements in Summer or Fall 2021 must apply and pay the degree fee by Friday, March 5th, to receive priority registration for summer and/or fall. Students who miss the deadline will not receive priority registration. Once you submit the online application, the \$90 fee will be assessed to your Statement of Account on ULink. If the fee is not paid at the time the application is submitted, a hold will be placed on your financial account. The application will still be processed.

STUDY ABROAD 2021 UPDATE

The Study Abroad Programs for the summer of 2021 have been cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. With the current data and trajectory path, it is not possible to run the programs without placing the health and safety of our students and faculty in jeopardy. LUNAR NEW YEAR

Year of the Ox

In multiple Asian cultures, Lunar New Year will begin on February 12th, starting with the first new moon of the lunar calendar and lasting until the first full moon.

While cultures vary in tradition, the celebration of the new year and new beginnings is a shared sentiment.

Family celebrations occur on New Year's Eve and on New Year's Day, usually including big meals and religious ceremonies.

A popular symbol of Lunar New Year is the red envelope. These envelopes contain money, but the red color of the envelope itself symbolizes good luck and fortune. On New Year's Day, these red envelopes are exchanged between family members.

In terms of Chinese zodiac, this year will be a year of the ox, specifically, year of the metal ox. The ox is characterized as hard-working, grounded, and trustworthy.
